What are best practices for making it work in my classroom? Effective reading instruction

Using polls and other interactive technologies to get a sense of students' experience, comprehension, and reactions ("reading the room") Inviting specific students' answers (cold calling) Opening the floor to general discussion of particular questions; Having students engage in small "buzz group" conversations via breakout rooms

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
