While most are safe for a mother to take and will not cause any harm to a breastfeeding infant, some medicines such as cytotoxic agents, lithium, radiopharmaceuticals, and retinoids must be avoided. ## **Pregnancy and Breastfeeding Warnings from Drugs.com**

Antidepressants, particularly SSRIs, are commonly used during pregnancy because an estimated 7 to 23% of pregnant women have perinatal depression. Physiologic and psychosocial changes during pregnancy can affect depression (possibly worsening it) and possibly reduce the response to antidepressants.

## **Medicine and Pregnancy | FDA**

No medication is 100 percent safe, and even medication that's safe for someone else to take during pregnancy might not be safe for you. So always check with your healthcare provider before you take any kind of medicine during pregnancy – even an over-the-counter (OTC) product. In general, don't take more than the recommended dose, and try to avoid taking anything during your first trimester because that's when your developing baby is most vulnerable to the effects of medication.

## **Guidelines | Treating for Two | Medications and Pregnancy ...**

Medicines should only be prescribed in pregnancy if the expected benefits to the mother are considered to be greater than the risk to the mother and foetus. First trimester exposure to medicines presents the greatest risk of foetal malformations. Third trimester exposure to medicines may be associated with withdrawal effects in the newborn.

## **Medicines and Use in Pregnancy**

Almost every pregnant woman will face a decision about taking medicines before and during pregnancy. However, not all medicines are safe to take during pregnancy. Some medicines may cause birth defects, pregnancy loss, prematurity, infant death, or developmental disabilities. Use medication only if absolutely indicated. Avoid initiating therapy during the first trimester. Select a medication with a proven track record in human pregnancy. Use a single-agent. Use the lowest effective dose. Discourage the use of over-the counter drugs that might interact with prescription medications.
